15:20 VARBIN VARBANOV: Evidence of fishing from the excavations of the Roman forts Sexaginta Prista and Trimamium

The article analyzes lead weights - coiled rectangular lead plates commonly referred to as "fishing net weights". Their identification is probably correct, as they are mostly found in sites near the Danube River or along the Black Sea coast. In Bulgarian archaeology, they are not among the attractive archaeological finds and so far they have not been given the necessary attention, nor have there been any publications about them. 36 weights have been found in Sexaginta Prista, and 35 in Trimamium, all in a late Roman context (4th -6th century). From the Thracian level (2nd-1st century BC) in Sexaginta Prista there are three lead objects of different shapes, which can also be connected to fishing. Only one such object comes from the Roman strata (3rd century). Fishing is also evidenced by the large amount of bones of various fish witnessed in the archaeozoological analysis at both Roman forts.

15:40 MELINDA SZABÓ: Damned merchants-Epigraphic evidence of fluvial trade on the Sava

Only four inscriptions are known in the territory of Pannonia, which are connected to the fluvial trade along the Sava river. The four epigraphs mention people with different social background. The main question of my paper is defining their role in trading networks and determining the forms of commercial cooperation. The key element of the presentation is the reinterpretation of the cursed tablet of Siscia, saying the cursed men were part of a trading network.

16:00 IVAN BOGDANOVIĆ: Roman amphitheatres, army and civilians on the Danube limes

This paper deals with the Roman amphitheatres on the Danube limes. Some buildings are archaeologically attested, while others are assumed according to the appearance of the terrain, epigraphic data and particular archaeological finds. Besides a few inscriptions, the location and construction of the amphitheatres will be discussed, which is important for understanding who built and used these buildings.

The presence of the amphitheatres on the Danube limes seems to be natural, as the relation between the army and such buildings is well known. There are also a couple of amphitheatres which were discovered within the civil settlements. Considering previous knowledge, information about amphitheatres on the Danube limes, about their construction and usage, this should be an important contribution to the study of entertainment buildings and gladiatorial games in the frontier provinces within this part of the Roman world.
